THE OUTRAGE AT CAPE MAY
Turns out to have been a much same said
one business than was first represented. The
following is an account of it, taken from the
Baltimore Patriot:

The Trouble at Cape May.—As the matter has created initial excitement in on, city, we have obtained the following accumus of it from a gentleman of Baltimore, who was present and witnessed the affair:

. On Wednesday evening, a difficulty oc cured between a negro waiter and a gentlema from Maryland, in the ball room of the Atlatic House, in this way: On the gentleman at tempting to take a glass of wine from the tray for a lady, the negro rudely repulsed his and at last dared him to take it. making a the same time some remarks against the d-Southerners, striking at the gentleman. A person who was hy, took sides with the mgrowand the matter here rested until after the hall. "I'hen the gentleman went up to the negro who had insulted and struck at him, and told the negro he meant to punish him. Upon this the negro drew back to strike the gentleman but received from him a severe blow, Immediately the fight became general between the Southerners and the negroes. The Southerners were nearly all Baltimoreans .--In the melee, chairs, tumblers, &c., were freely used, but the negroes were soon driven from the ball room. Immediately, however, they rallied in front of the house, with clubs, knives, &c., uttering the fiercest outle and threats against all Southerners, and during them to come out. Finally, the negroes withdrew.

The next day, the negroes, excited by extain persons on the Island, held a meetwo and resolved to be revenged upon the Southerners; and particularly upon the Bakingreans.

That night, in order to preserve quiet, and at the request of the ladies of the house, who were of course, terrified at the uproar of the previous night, many of the Southerners left the house.

All manner of reports of this matter, of course, greatly exaggerated, are in circultion. The above is a plain statem at of the affair, as we received it from the lips of the gentleman present.

In all this, we see the results of the accuraed spirit of abolition, and we trust it will have the effect of abolishing Southern company from Northern Watering Places, where ther are augually fleeced out of thousands of dollars, and denounced, as soon as their backs are turned, as a set of slave breeders. There are plenty of watering places on the southern coast and in the Southern mountains to afford health and recreation to Southern people .-At these places, the society is infinitely profferable to that at Cape May, Saratoga and New Port; for at our Southern resorts, you may know with whom you are secociating. and incur no hazard of figuring in a couling with a New, York prostitute, or taking a hand at whist with a pickpocket. the thousands that resort to the Northern witering places, the very strictest vigilance utterly incapable of excluding vile characten. and many impositions are annually made by them on the society of virtuous people. tie, then, spend our money and take our com fort in our own-country, where health and happiness can be as easily procured as any Pet. Intwhere under the sun.

That the said Marion O'Mera inefficient and incompetent and has not made fit provision for the proper rearing of her said children and is unfit to be entrusted with the care and education of said minor children.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that an order may be made by your Honor upon the said John O'Mera and Marion O'Mera and the said Rodney O'Mera and Ruth O'Mera to show cause why the care and control of the said Rodney O'Mera and Ruth O'Mera should not be taken out of the control and custody of the said John O'Mera and Marion O'Mera and placed in the care and control of the said



Deed Restrictions

UNDER AND SUBJECT, NEVERTHELESS, to the following restrictons and reservations; that there shall not be erected upon any portion of the aforesaid premises any dwelling house costing less than \$1,500.00; that no building, porch, or extension be built at a distance of less than 20 feet from the side of the abutting streets; that the use and enjoyment of said premises are restricted to the white race only; that no outside privy or other such contrivance is permitted or to be kept upon the said premises; that no gasoline and/or oil station shall be erected or maintained on said premises; that no sale of alcoholis beverages to the public on the said premises is permitted; that if and when it is found necessary or for the benefit of such streets to lay and put curbs or sidewalks on the abutting streets, the right is hereby reserved to lay such sidewalks and curbs by the proper municipal authorities or the developers, to a width not to exceed eight feet back from the present sidelines of the abutting streets.






HOTEL DALE, c. 1913. Our tour of Cape May's historic accommodations ends on Lafayette Street, east of Jefferson, where the White Hall was built in 1850 for Dr. Samuel S. Marcy, whose brick house still stands on the corner. In 1911, black entrepreneur E.W. Dale gave the old building new life as "the most finely equipped and most sanitary Afro-American hotel known."

NEGROES COLONIZE IN NEW JERSEY

Former Representative White of North Carolina Heads Big Movement in Cape May County.

LAYS OUT TOWN AND FARMS

Sea Isle City, Oct. 6.-The great success of the Russian Hebrew colony of Woodbine, founded by Baron de Hirsch, has recently attracted another colony founder to Cape May countyformer Representative White, of North Carolina, a negro.

The new colony is in the lower end of the county on a tract of 3,500 acres. Already many negro families from Virginia and North Carolina have sethas been laid out on a plat of 500 acres. In close proximity are half a dozen seashore resorts, where the negro far-mers will find a ready market for their pass the enabling act.

The founder will allow only the better class of southern negroes to join the colony. He has agents in the

The land has been laid out in farms of ten, twenty and fifty acres. The soil is unusually fertile and yielded abundant crops to the pioneers this year.

About January 1, thirty families will arrive from Charlotte, N. C. Whitesboro lies along the line of the Pennsylvania and Reading systems. Many to property owners. who become residents of the town will find employment in the summer months at Cape May, Holly Beach, Wildwood, Anglesea, Sea Isle City, and Ocean City.



The opinion voiced by these speakers was based on the fact that the assessed valuation of the proposed borough limits in the village o? Whitesboro was not su? 'icient to pay the expenses of an incorporated town. Letters were also received from Mr. S. H. Vick a large property owner in the village expressing the same sentiment as that o' the previous speakers.

Mr. John F. Lee spoke in Pavor o' the proposition, using as his basic fact that 11 property in Whiteboro was not taxed alike and i' this was done, and that it would be done is a Borough, money enough would be collected to carry on all expenses o' such government. At this time, each person of the age of twenty-one or over was called upon to vote for or against the proposition. 






